Dear Prime Minister

The Green and Labour party at Brighton and Hove City Council, along with Trade Unions in the city are taking the unprecedented step of joining together to launch a petition and write this open letter to you to outline the urgent actions that are required to avert crisis in our local public services.

Yesterday's budget statement has done next to nothing to alleviate the financial emergency our council faces, other than to lay an even bigger burden on the shoulders of our residents by making a 5% increase in council tax inevitable. Over the last twelve years successive Tory governments have cut £110m from our city's budgets, and frozen public sector pay. At the same time demand for our services has increased as our citizens bear the brunt of over a decade of policies that have made the rich richer, and the poor poorer. Over the last year, average weekly pay has increased in the private sector at three times the rate of that in the public sector and as a result, many key workers in Brighton and Hove are reduced to using food banks and struggling to afford to live in their home city.

As the cost-of-living crisis blights the lives of everyone in our city, and millions in the country are bracing themselves to have to choose between heating and eating, councils across the country are now going to have to choose between jobs or services. As Brighton & Hove residents face one of the toughest winters in living memory, they need to know their local councils are getting the support they need from government, not watch them be slowly starved of cash and resources while the government pursues policies that disproportionately benefit the most well off.

We ask you to urgently review the settlement for local government and fund a minimum inflation level pay rise for local government workers. We are struggling to retain key staff such as social workers, care workers, planners and teaching assistants; many of whom can now earn more working in hospitality and retail. The services they run are vital to the health and wellbeing of residents, and the skills and experience they have amassed are invaluable and costly to replace.

Local government has already been cut to the bone. There is nothing left to take, and there is no justification for making ordinary people and public services pay for mistakes that they did not make. As politicians, employers and unions, we are joined in solidarity to demand that you fulfil your role

as the country's leading public servant, in protecting and funding the very services and workers that the public rely on the most.
